Deal to evacuate Syria's Yarmuk refugee camp

A deal has been reached for the evacuation of the Palestinian refugee camp of Yarmuk where Islamic State group fighters have been holed up in southern Damascus, state media reported yesterday. The transfer of "terrorist groups" to rebel-held areas of northwestern Syria would begin today, said the official SANA news agency, which did not name IS militants. It came hours after the Syrian government and rebels agreed to evacuate opposition fighters from the areas of Yalda, Babila and Beit Sahem, also in southern Damascus, according to SANA. Page 11

N Korea offers to shut nuclear test site in May

North Korea has promised to shut its atomic test site within weeks and invite American weapons experts to verify its closure, Seoul reported yesterday, as new US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said Washington had an "obligation" to pursue peace. North Korean leader Kim Jong-un - who may meet US President Donald Trump as early as next month - also said Pyongyang would have no need for nuclear weapons if it were promised it would not be invaded. according to Seoul, Friday's historic meeting saw Kim and South Korean President Moon Jae-in agree to pursue the complete denuclearisation of the peninsula. Imran Khan woos poor in election pitch

Pakistani opposition figure Imran Khan yesterday vowed to sweep to power in upcoming elections, promising radical change for the poor at a campaign kick-off rally in Lahore that has long been the power base of ousted premier Nawaz Sharif. With the red-brick minarets of Lahore's Mughal-era Badshahi mosque in sight, Khan outlined a populist 11-point plan to usher in a new era of prosperity.

Pompeo stresses need for unity among Gulf allies

ew US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo stressed the need for unity among Gulf allies during a brief visit to Riyadh yesterday.

In advance of Pompeo's visit, US officials told reporters the US secretary of state would urge Saudi Foreign Minister Adel al-Jubeir, Crown Prince Mohamed bin Salman and King Salman to resolve the Gulf crisis in a series of meetings on Saturday and yesterday.

In joint remarks with al-Jubeir, Pompeo said: "Gulf unity is necessary and we need to achieve it."

Addressing the rift between Qatar and its neighbours, Pompeo told reporters after leaving Riyadh: "We are hopeful that they will, in their own way, figure out how to remove the dispute between them."

Officials said Pompeo called for an end to the blockade because the US believes it has enabled Iran to exploit disunity in the Gulf by enhancing its influence in Yemen and Syria, The Associated Press news agency reported.

Saudi Arabia, along with the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Egypt, cut off travel and trade ties with Qatar last June, accusing it of supporting terrorism and Iran on the other side of the Gulf.

Doha has denied the accusations and has said its three fellow Gulf countries aim to curtail its sovereignty. For its part, Iran denies supporting terrorism or having sought to develop nuclear

The United States, which has military bases in Qatar and some other countries in the region, is trying to mediate the Gulf crisis. Trump is also pushing for a resolution.

Pompeo met earlier with Saudi King Salman for about 15 minutes before heading directly to Israel, for talks with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu.

Just hours after being confirmed as Trump's top diplomat, Pompeo set off on a whirlwind trip to Nato in Brussels and Middle East allies.

The trip comes as Trump considers whether or not to abandon a self-imposed May 12 deadline for the Iran nuclear deal he sees as deeply flawed. He has called on Gulf allies to contribute funding and troops to stabilise areas in Iraq and Syria where a US-led coalition has largely defeated Islamic State militants.

Asked about Saudi troops on the ground in Syria, Pompeo said: "We will sit down and talk about... how to best make sure that this is not Amer-

ica alone working on this, it's the Gulf states working alongside us."

Britain said yesterday that it, France and Germany - the other signatories to the 2015 deal along with Russia, China and the European Union - had agreed the Iran accord was the best way of stopping Tehran from gaining nuclear weapons.

"(We) committed to continue working closely together and with the US on how to tackle the range of challenges that Iran poses - including those issues that a new deal might cover," a statement from British Prime Minister Theresa May's office said.

The 2015 agreement limited Iran's enrichment of uranium for nuclear fuel to help ensure it could not be turned to developing bomb material, and Tehran secured a removal of most international sanctions in return.

Iran has repeatedly said its ballistic missile programme has nothing to do with its nuclear work and is non-negotiable.

Trump sees three defects in the deal: a failure to address Iranian ballistic missiles; the terms under which UN inspectors can visit allegedly suspect Iranian nuclear sites; and "sunset" clauses under which key limits on the Iranian nuclear programme start to expire after 10 years. Page 11

Qatar welcomes opening of ILO office in Doha

he Ministry of Administrative Development, Labour and Social Affairs (MADLSA) has announced the opening of an International Labour Organisation (ILO) office in Doha yesterday.

The launch of the ILO's first office in

The launch of the ILO's first office in the Gulf region, marks a key moment at the start of implementing a three-year technical agreement signed in October 2017 by the Government of Qatar and the United Nations agency.

The agreement will strengthen national labour laws, build government employees' enforcement capacity and ensure employment and recruitment practices are in line with international best practice.

"Qatar welcomes the opening of the ILO office in Doha," said HE the Minister of Administrative Development, Labour and Social Affairs, Dr Issa Saad al-Jafali al-Nuaimi, who led the opening of the office.

"This is another step towards ensuring Qatar has a labour system that reflects global best practice. The Government of Qatar now has another partner to promote and protect the rights of our guest workers," he said.

The ILO Doha office will help facilitate ongoing co-operation between the Government of Qatar and the ILO, which will work closely with the MADLSA.

The technical agreement focuses on five areas: improving wages, improving work and occupational health and safety inspections, implementing a contractual system and improving work conditions and procedures, strengthening prevention measures for forced

labour and human trafficking (including the prosecution of those involved in it), and giving a voice to labourers and enforcing complaint mechanisms.

A number of projects have been im-

plemented since the start of co-operation between the two parties in January 2018.

These include holding a workshop focused on reviewing the minimum

wage, and organising an occupational health and safety conference which addressed issues to protect workers from fatigue during the summer. Workshops for specialised government officials were also held, tackling

trafficking, and establishing mechanisms to strengthen the complaint system for workers.

In May, workshops will be held to raise awareness of the domestic work-

ways to fight forced labour and human

ers' law, wage protection and the ministry's law on summer working hours. "Qatar leads the region when it comes to labour rights. The techni-

comes to labour rights. The technical expertise and guidance of the ILO will be crucial as Qatar transitions to a modern labour system that meets the highest standards not only in the GCC but in the world," the minister said.

In October last year, the International Trade Union Confederation praised Qatar's commitment to protecting workers' rights and assured that the conditions it had called for had been met.

In the same month, Human Rights Watch's Middle East Director Sarah Leah Whitson called on other countries in the region to follow Qatar's example and take similar steps to monitor and reform their labour practices.

EU grants Silatech €5mn for empowering Yemenis

Silatech, an international non-governmental social development organisation, has succeeded in obtaining a European Union grant of €5mm for its ongoing efforts to achieve stability in Yemen through the empowerment of youth and women.

Within this co-operation, Silatech, that works to connect young people to jobs and economic opportunities through employment and entrepreneurship, will establish a fund implemented by its field partner Al-Amal microfinance bank which will provide grants to more than 10,000 youth (18-35)

years), in addition to providing training to 5,000 young people.

Furthermore, the initiative supports Yemeni women as they represent 60% of the targeted youth in the project, seeking to achieve a world in which youth including young women are involved in the economic development of their societies.

The initiative also seeks to contribute to support rural youth and small productive projects that may help them improve their economic situation; reducing poverty and unemployment, as well as the problem of rural youth migrating to cities in search of jobs.

QP in long-term deal to supply Vietnam with LPG and naphtha

atar Petroleum (QP) has announced an agreement to supply Vietnam with up to 2mm tonnes per year (tpy) of liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) and naphtha for 15

The long-term agreement was signed by Qatar Petroleum for the sale of Petroleum Products Company (QP-SPP) and Long Son Petrochemicals

Company (LSP), a subsidiary of The Siam Cement Public Company Limited. Qatar Petroleum acts as the marketing agent for QPSPP.

The agreement will commence with the start of Vietnam's first green-field petrochemical complex, which is being constructed on Long Son Island, 100km southeast of Ho Chi Minh City. The large facility is expected to begin production in 2022.

Qatar Petroleum President & CEO Saad Sherida al-Kaabi welcomed the signing of the agreement and said: "We are pleased to enter into this agreement for the supply of naphtha and LPG to Vietnam. This agreement has a significant

importance as it is the first time that Qatar is selling LPG and naphtha on a long-term basis as well as the first time that we are selling directly to Vietnam."


Al-Kaabi said: "I would like to thank LSP and its shareholders for their trust in Qatar Petroleum by entering into this agreement for the supply of feedstock to LSP for the next 15 years. This is an important project for Vietnam and the new agreement reflects the trust of the markets and customers in Qatar Petroleum as a reliable supplier.

"We attach great importance to partnerships that would help our customers meet their energy needs. This agreement will expand Qatar's footprint into

the growing markets of Southeast Asia and we believe that LSP is the right partner for us in this endeavour."

Cholanat Yanaranop, president, SCG Chemicals Company and Board Member, LSP, said: "This agreement is very crucial to LSP. It provides the security and flexibility of feedstock to LSP's olefins flexible feed cracker, which will enhance the competitive advantage of LSP over its peers."

The LSP Project will have a million tons per year ethylene cracker with flexible gas and naphtha feed to yield in total olefins production capacity of up to 1.6mn tons per year depending on the feedstock mix.

Call to set up chamber for high-end fashion

The designer who is promot-

ing Made in Italy Luxury LTT, led a team of four Italian companies at their pavilion in the Heya Arabian Fashion Exhibition. BKIB, Anita Bilardi, Maison Vi, Kristal B were the four Italian brands that took part in the expo this year.

introduce new brands at the exhibition in Qatar, our chamber has been able to send a large number of Italian firms to this country in the last six years since the start of the exhibition," she said. "Organising two exhibitions of high-end fashion apparels and accessories is no mean challenge and Qatar is doing an admirable thing to promote such businesses in a big way.
